Registration information has already been sent via email to all state officers and division officers and to state level committee members. If you are a state or division officer and/or a state level committee member and you are not receiving emails from me, please alert me to this fact.



Then you need to apply to attend the "2013 Summer Institute: Military Career Pathways 101" or MCP 101 for short. It was a real eye opener. I was privileged to be in the inaugural class of educators which included Career Development Coordinators, Special Populations Coordinators, and Middle and High School Counselors at the 2012 MCP 101 on June 26-28th at Fort Bragg in Fayetteville, NC. This exciting new event was sponsored by the U.S. Army Recruiting Battalion in Raleigh (kudos to Deborah Roach, Education Services Specialist, who knew how to get things done) and coordinated by the NC Department of Public Instruction's Education and Military Collaboration Committee, with support from Career and Technical Education and Student Services. Our very own, Marchelle Horner, DPI Career Development Consultant, was instrumentally in making this event possible and was a part of the class as well. She was accompanied by her "battle buddy" Linda Brannan, DPI Student Services Consultant, another player at the planning table and attendee.

NCTEA Proposed Name Change

The North Carolina Technology Education Association's Executive Board met on Monday, July 23rd, 2012. During the board meeting a motion was made to change the name of our organization and following the motion there was discussion regarding the motion resulting in an amended motion. The amended motion of changing our organization's name to the "North Carolina Association of Technology, Engineering and Design" (NCATED) was then discussed and accepted by the board. The members of NCTEA will have the opportunity to vote on this name change in 60 days. The vote will be an electronic vote.

Rolesville High School's VEX Robotics Team Earns an Overall Second Place Win at Nationals

Wake Forest – Rolesville High School had 2 teams of 2 students each to compete in the VEX Robotics event at the Technology Student Association 34th National Conference. This year's VEX event had approximately 80 entries from all over the country. Teams were tasked with designing, building, programming and operating a robot that would score field elements into goals on a 12' by 12' arena. Chapters with more than one team were placed into two different "divisions" for qualifying and elimination matches to keep teams from eliminating teams from their own chapter until the final match, where the winner from each division goes head-to-head.

Team A from WFRHS consisted of Dalton Johnson and Brandon Fitzpatrick, both Juniors, who finished in the 1st place alliance at the NCTSA Conference. They were able to finish the qualifying rounds in Nashville in 11th place out of 40 teams in the Science division. They were asked to be part of the 4th-place alliance but were eliminated in the semifinal round of their division. Zach Gadoury and Jefferey Fitzpatrick formed Team B from WFRHS. They finished in the 2nd place alliance at the NCTSA event, which qualified them for the national event as well. After their qualifying rounds at the national event, they were in 17th place of the Technology division when the top 8 teams started choosing their alliance members. They were chosen in the 2nd round of drafting to be on the 2nd place alliance. Apart from their first elimination round, all of their match-ups in this division were forced to a 3rd match in a best 2 out of 3 elimination heats.

They were able to defeat the 1st place team in their division to advance to the tournament finals against the winners from the Science division, who happened to be the team that eliminated WFRHS Team A in the quarterfinals. This proved to be one of the most exciting finals as each team won one match forcing them to face off in a winner-take-all 3rd match. Unfortunately, their alliance was narrowly defeated in the 3rd match, earning them 2nd place overall. All of my students were thrilled to be a part of such an exciting and interactive event. As an advisor, I couldn't be more proud of their accomplishments. To wrap it all up, Team B finished in the 2nd place alliance and Team A finished as one of the top 8 alliances.

North Carolina Teacher Becomes State's First WindSenator

Bar Harbor, ME (August 5, 2012) – Thelma Kastl, a middle school teacher from West Jefferson, NC, has successfully completed the 5-day WindSenator training course in Maine. The WindSenators are a select group of master teachers representing 25 states states who completed an intensive training session on wind energy science education hosted by KidWind. Thelma is the first WindSenator from the state of North Carolina.

According to the American Wind Energy Association, wind power continues to be one of the fastest growing energy sources in the world. By 2030, wind energy may provide as much as 20 percent of the nation's electricity, supporting 500,000 jobs and billions of dollars in new domestic economic investment. The WindSenators form a nationwide network of educators leading an outreach effort to engage students in renewable energy. WindSenators provide wind energy teacher trainings in their state and region, and also help facilitate student-driven wind turbine design competitions known as the KidWind Challenge.

"We desperately need to engage the next generation of leaders in the science and technology, research and development that will help make a renewable energy future a reality" said Michael Arquin, KidWind Project Founder and Director. "While our main goal is to improve energy science education, it is also very important to us that teachers become enthusiastic and knowledgeable resources for their students, schools and communities."



Thelma Kastl was selected and supported to attend this training through a joint scholarship from KidWind, the US Department of Energy's Wind for Schools Program, and Appalachian State University. Mrs. Kastl will now be facilitating teacher training workshops and student outreach events in North Carolina.

As a feature of the NCTEA Newsletter we will try to provide a book review and suggested accompanying activities that we feel can be tied into our curriculum, into the core curriculum and into technology assessment. David Sanders has written the following review and accompanying activity suggestions for the book Medusa.

Medusa by Clive Cussler with Paul Kemprecos

Deep in the Pacific Ocean there are creatures unknown to most of the scientific community. One of these is the Blue Medusa jellyfish. The Medusa behaves unlike any other jellyfish. Instead of killing its victim with venom and eating it, the Medusa injects a venom that paralyzes its prey as well as a "medicine" that keeps its prey alive so it can take its time consuming it.

Those of you NCTEA members lucky enough to attend the 2011 Winter Conference were treated to a behind the scenes tour of the BTEC facility at NC State University's Centennial Campus. The BTEC facility is a state of the art biotechnology lab that allows students, researchers, and industry partners to learn and research biotech processes for future commercial or medical applications. The first thing they showed us is this beaker full of some strange glowing liquid. This liquid happens to be a green fluorescent protein (GFP) that is extracted from a jellyfish and naturally produces a bright green fluorescence. They are commercially using the GFP to genetically engineer a pet called the GloFish. Originally intended to be used as a biosensor, scientists are working on a way to make the GloFish selectively fluoresce in the presence of environmental toxins. To make the GloFish, scientists inject the GFP from jellyfish, sea anemone, or coral and inject them into the embryo of a zebra fish. The result is a fish that permanently fluoresce green, red, orange blue or purple. Though the science is cool, I will let you make your own decisions about the ethics for trans-species genetics. Nevertheless, it is a good topic for a classroom discussion. So what does all of this have to do with a book? Well, Cussler and Kemprecos weave all of this, the unknown creatures of the deep and the science of genetics, into a story of international intrigue. If you are a Cussler fan, you might be weary of the predictability of the overall plot, but I think they did a good job with their research by developing a twist on a common theme that seems at the very least plausible. I think the best part for me was that I read this story shortly after visiting BTEC and I got chills when I realized scientists and students at BTEC were using the same basic technology that they mention in the book.

One of the things I instill in my students is that we can learn a lot from nature. One of my classroom projects includes biomimicry, where students design and program LEGO Sumo robots that look and behave like creatures from nature. The project is great because you see things like a scorpion attacking a polar bear; something that wouldn't happen in nature for various reasons, only now the scorpion is the same size as the polar bear. The project also allows students to develop research and writing skills, understand scientific concepts like motor torque and coefficient of friction, focus on a complex living organism's physiology, movement, and behavior all while working on a fun robotics project.

You can probably find this book at the library or possibly in the bargain box at some stores. It was a good read and if you have a slight grasp on the technology, it will make the story even more believable. If you have room in your classroom, write a grant to get an aquarium and fill them with GloFish. The GloFish website has some cool educational resources and activities for students to do. Finally, we are blessed with a curriculum that allows us to do some really engaging projects, so use your creativity and let your kids learn while they are having fun.
