NOTICE: PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO NCACTE BYLAWS

During a regular meeting of the NCACTE Board of Directors on Feb. 18, 2012, the NCACTE Board of Directors voted to recommend to the NCACTE Assembly of Delegates that NCACTE change from a "deunified" state association to a "unified" state association. This change would remove the option that NCACTE members currently have that allows a member to be a "state member only." If approved by the Assembly of Delegates on Wednesday July 25, this change would become effective July 1, 2013. ALL MEMBERS ARE ENCOURAGED TO ATTEND THE ASSEMBLY OF DELEGATES.

ARTICLE III - Affiliation with ACTE

As an affiliated state association of ACTE, and in accordance with the ACTE Bylaws, NCACTE shall be organized for the purpose of providing leadership and services to promote, improve, and maintain the quality of career and technical education. The organizational structure of ACTE shall embrace all those interested in career and technical education in the state; and each member shall be provided an opportunity to affiliate with any divisional category in the ACTE structure. NCACTE shall pay affiliated membership dues directly to ACTE for its members. The bylaws of NCACTE shall not be in conflict with the ACTE Bylaws.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT #1

ARTICLE III - Affiliation with ACTE

NCACTE shall be a "unified" state association affiliated with the national Association for Career and Technical Education. As an affiliated state association of ACTE, and in accordance with the ACTE Bylaws, NCACTE shall be organized for *Continued on page 13*

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
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From Your President....

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE Tom Jones, NCACTE Executive Director

Since our last published newsletter NCACTE has held it Spring Professional Development Workshop and Board of Directors' Meeting. This event took place Feb. 17-18, 2012, at the Hampton Inn in Morehead City. Sixty-eight members attended this event. This year's professional development workshop was focused on preparing for our Summer Conference. NC-DPI Career & Technical Education staff members were present and lead the curriculum update sessions and Summer Conference planning.



During our annual Town hall meeting members were given an opportunity to express their views on current issues and concerns that our professional organization is facing. Membership recruitment, membership dues, and unification with ACTE were among the issues discussed.

During the February Board of Directors' meeting the Board voted to recommend to our Assembly of Delegates a proposed amendment that would cause our state association to become a "unified state association." A copy of the proposed amendment is included in this newsletter.

ACTE's National Policy Seminar took place March 5-7, 2012, in Washington, D.C. Eight people attended from North Carolina including the following: Kristina Yarborough (NCACTE President-Elect), Aaron Fleming (NCACTE Legislative Committee Chair), Todd Williams Tom Jones (NCACTE Executive Director), Graham Yarborough, Dr. Jim Flowers, Dr. Gary Moore (ACTE Immediate Past President), and Bena Weires.

For the past eight years NCACTE has sponsored a Raleigh Legislative Policy Seminar. This activity is one of the most important activities on our calendar. This year's Policy Seminar is scheduled for May 22, 2012, at the DoubleTree by Hilton, University- Brownstone in Raleigh. As always, it is very important that we be well represented at this seminar. The purpose of the event was to expose students to various careers making them aware of the education and/or skills needed for that career and to help them make appropriate high school course selections when registering. It was a great day for all students who left the Career fair armed with the knowledge and information necessary to begin making plans for their future.

At the Central Regional Career Development Coordinators/Special Populations meeting on March 23, two round table discussions will be presented regarding two initiatives used in the Chapel Hill LEA Career Technical Education Departments. Both programs are administered by CDC's and Special Population Coordinators. Mildred Gerald and Winslow Carter will present a round table discussing summer "Gender Equity Camps". There are two camps. One camp for girls, is directed by Mildred Gerald. It brings in speakers and has classes in the areas of information technology, web-page design, gaming and architecture and engineering. All presenters are women with careers in these respective areas. A field trip will take the girls to an IT (Information Technology) industry in the area.

The camp for boys is directed by Winslow Carter. This camp is for rising 9th and 10th grade boys. They are exposed to allied health careers men often do not consider such as: nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy, medical technology etc. Additionally they get level I first aid certification and CPR certification. There will be EMS demonstrations and a life flight helicopter from Duke Medical Center. It ends with a field trip to UNC Hospital with tour of it's facilities.

The second round table will be presented by Mary Jones and Fletcher Womble. This initiative is a program used for high risk students both academically and behaviorally. It works with CTE students for the most part through study skills classes. This program is a team of our CDC's, Social Workers, and Special Population Coordinators. They meet with a group of students weekly and go over a 10-program called, "Why Try"? It uses a concept called "The Reality Ride". It helps students deal with issues that prevent academic success such as lack of family support, self-esteem issues, peer pressure and other hindrances. It is an opportunity for all students to get involved and have a measure of success which lead to better motivation and success for the student. It is a great tool to reach those students on the fringes that often get left out and eventually drop out of school.

The Cabarrus County School (CCS) System (under the direction of the CCS CDC's/SPC's) is planning to offer three "Career Cluster Camps" during the months of June and July (2012) for interested students. In June, there will be an "Engineering Camp" sponsored by Duke Energy; in July, "Camp Med" (via the Charlotte AHEC) and Construction Camp (through the Associated Builders & Contractors of the Carolinas and NCDOT) will be available for qualified applicants. These camps will provide participants an opportunity to look at the various types of jobs available in each Career area. Students will meet with Community College representatives (about the 2-year degree programs)...which can transfer into the 4-year (University) program...or they can find out what is required to enter directly into a 4-year programs. Handson activities will be provided for participants, as well as visits to local businesses/industries in each of the three Career Cluster areas.

STRATEGIC PLAN — 2012-2013

GOAL I MEMBERSHIP RECRUITMENT AND RETENTION

- 1. Each division to increase membership in their division by 20% to reach a minimum of 1200 members by June 30, 2013.
- 2. Encourage national affiliation with ACTE.

STRATEGIES

- I. Maintain district representatives to promote membership within the district.
 - a. Provide members and potential members with ACTE benefit package options.
 - b. Provide current and inactive membership rosters to each division vice president and treasurer for recruitment and retention.
 - c. Ensure availability of membership applications and benefits information via newsletter and website.
 - d. Promote and recognize life members from each division.
- 2. Encourage membership recruitment at new teacher workshops and through the CTE Directors.
- 3. Increase awareness, both inside and outside of the CTE community of how NCACTE's programs provide value to CTE teachers and administrators.
- 4. Promote membership in NCACTE with business and industry partners and add Business Partners under New and Related Services.

GOAL 2 PUBLIC POLICY ADVOCACY

- I. Increase outside awareness of CTE programs to local, state, and national legislative officials and decision makers.
- 2. Increase awareness among CTE community of local, state, and national legislative issues facing CTE teachers,

administrators, and students.

STRATEGIES

- I. Members will be encouraged to participate in NCACTE and ACTE legislative networks and understand Legislative Platform.
- 2. Post legislative newsletter and NCACTE newsletter on the website.
 - a. Distribute association/CTE issues to site-based colleagues and solicit assistance.
 - b. Ensure members are aware of Legislative Platform for 2012-2013.
 - c. Encourage Legislative committee to network among members, colleagues, and business leaders throughout their assigned region.
- 3. Publicize the North Carolina Legislative Seminar in May 2013 on website, newsletter, and other communication media.
- 4. Send LEA Legislators news of events through the NCACTE newsletter to promote CTE programs.

GOAL 3 PROFESSIONAL ADVOCACY

- All CTE teachers and administrators will have a working knowledge of how NCACTE provides benefits to them in their position.
- 2. NCACTE will provide helpful tools for all CTE teachers and administrators for use in their professional development.

GOAL 3 STRATEGIES

- I. Promote, as needed, planning of professional development workshops.
- 2. Assess in-service needs of NCACTE officers and members.
- 3. Encourage participation of all officers and committee members in workshops and conferences provided by NCACTE and ACTE
- 4. Encourage Presidents of divisions to communicate roles and responsibilities and give job descriptions to standing committee members, before appointment, concerning attendance at fall, spring and summer conferences.
- 5. Use evaluation process at each leadership conference for innovative ideas and topics requested by participants.
- 6. Select volunteers from the organization to facilitate and /or present during conferences.
- 7. Utilize newsletter and website to request presenters.

GOAL 4 PROFESSIONALISM

- I. Advocate for professional credentials
- 2. Advocate for recognition of achievement.
- 3. Advocate for involvement in NCACTE by all members.

STRATEGIES

- I. Encourage members to seek credentials/certifications.
- 2. Actively seek members to participate in local, state, regional, and national awards programs.
- 3. Recognize members who achieve awards from local, state, regional, and national programs.
- 4. Actively promote participation in leadership programs.
- 5. Awards committee will solicit participation from each division for state and national awards.
- 6. Acknowledge divisions that submit candidates for awards.
- 7. Recognize CTE teachers who are national board certified on the website and newsletter.
- 8. Provide leadership training opportunities in divisions through joint ACTE workshops.
- 9. Encourage divisions to recruit award program participants.

GOAL 5 PARTNERSHIPS

- I. Strengthen communication between all divisions.
- 2. ALL members to enlist support from business and industry.
- 3. All NCACTE members to participate in other professional groups and civic organizations to promote Career & Technical Education.

STRATEGIES

- I. Ensure that the Executive Board and Board of Directors is representative of all divisions.
- 2. Encourage members to support multiple divisions.
- 3. Ensure that NCACTE members are treated with dignity and respect.
- 4. Encourage business, industry and community members to support organizational activity.
- 5. Tagging links with businesses through the NCACTE website.

- I. Identify potential leaders among members and encourage involvement in their division, state and national association.
- 2. Develop future NCACTE leadership.
- 3. Increase member participation in all conferences and workshops.

ARTICLE IV - Membership

Section 3 - Deunified Membership.NCACTE is a deunified affiliate association of ACTE. All members shall hold membership in at least one division of NCACTE. Membership in ACTE will be an option for NCACTE members. All dues shall be paid through the respective NCACTE division treasurers, as prescribed in Section 7 of this article.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT #2

ARTICLE IV - Membership

Section 3 - Unified Membership. NCACTE is a"unified" affiliate association of ACTE. All members of NCACTE shall also be members of ACTE and at least one NCACTE division.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT #3

Add to existing Bylaws

ARTICLE VIII, Section 3A, Nominations

In the event that a minimum of 3 candidates are not submitted by the cluster divisions currently on rotation the Executive Board will have the authority to:

Return to each division that has presented insufficient nominations for President Elect and rerequest to fulfill their candidate obligation.

In the event that the cluster division does not fulfill their candidate obligation to theExecutive Board, the Board will have the authority to go outside the cluster divisions currently on rotation for President Elect candidates to solicit enough qualified candidates (minimum of 3, maximum of 6) to satisfy nominations requirement for President Elect.


CNC Machinists Are In Demand From Wilkes Community College


