From Your State Superintendent

On November 15, 2010, State Superintendent June Atkinson, Microsoft executives and other special guests gathered at a press conference at Leesville Road High School in Raleigh to announce that North Carolina will be the first state in the country to offer the Microsoft IT Academy Program in high schools statewide.

The Microsoft IT Academy Program offers users access to the latest Microsoft software, E-Learning courses, and other shared collaboration tools so they can gain skills in widely-used Microsoft Office programs. Teachers and students also are able to earn certification as Microsoft Office Specialists by completing course work and passing professional certification examinations.



"The ability to effectively use Word, Excel, PowerPoint, Access and Excel are essential skills for employees working in most businesses and offices today," said State Superintendent June Atkinson. "I am pleased that North Carolina can provide this opportunity for teachers to improve their skills and for students to be career-ready."

Microsoft IT Academy courses are currently available in 37 pilot high schools in 29 school districts. By mid-November, 20 additional school district leaders signed on to begin field testing the program in some of their local high schools in January 2011. Starting in August 2011, Microsoft IT Academy courses should be available in high schools statewide. The NCDPI also plans to recommend the Microsoft IT Academy courses to replace Computer Applications I, which is currently a part of the *CTE Standard Course of Study* and the state's largest elective with 50,000 to 60,000 students enrolled annually.

"In 2008-2009, the four-year cohort graduation rate among CTE completers was 86.7 percent, which was higher than our statewide graduation rate of 71.7 percent," Atkinson said. "By providing courses such as the ones offered through CTE and the Microsoft IT Academy, we are making learning more relevant to students' college and career goals, which helps keep them on track to stay in school and graduate."

"Career and College ...Ready, Set, Go" was the theme for the NCACTEA Fall Administrators Conference this year held in Cary, NC on October 20-22. The theme expanded on the Governor's initiative to prepare every student to graduate from high school ready for college, a career or technical training. Conference information focused on current economic and business trends affecting Career and Technical Education as well as curriculum updates from the NC Department of Public Instruction.

Attendees were greeted and welcomed on October 20th by the Mayor of Cary, Harold Weinbrecht, and the Superintendent of Franklin County Schools, Dr. Eddie Ingram. The Louisburg High School Air Force JROTC, directed by Col. Johnson, Msgt. Koger, followed the opening remarks with a Presentation of Colors. Then the local Hillsborough Orange High School FFA impressed the audience by conducting an official opening of ceremonies along with the NCACTEA officers. The opening day sessions provided information to strengthen links between our high school curricula







and local economies beginning with a presentation from Caroline McCullen, Director of SAS Education Initiatives on the North Carolina Joining our Business and Schools (JOBS) Commission, and later in the afternoon with a "Building Partnerships with Biotechnology" presentation by Poul Lindegaard, Customer Solutions Americas Director for Novozymes North America, Inc. The day ended with a dynamic discussion from a "Crisis of Relevance " panel



responding to information compiled from the "Crisis of Relevance " survey by Greg Gift, Assistant State CTE Director and Marty Tobey, CTE Northwest Regional Coordinator. Panel

members included Tom Haffner (President, P.T. International Corporation), Dr. Bill Harrison (Chairman, State Board of Education), Charles Hayes (President and CEO, Research Triangle Regional Partnership), David Hollars (Executive Director, Centralina Workforce Development Board, Inc.), Bill Seyler (Senior Project Manager, Bovis Lend Lease, Inc.), Joan McGinnis (Director, CTE/ Secondary Schools, Onslow County Schools), and Luis Maldonado (Technology Education Teacher, Wake County Schools).

The second day morning provided participants with a look at "The Shape of Things to Come" by Lee Anne Nance, Sr. Vice President of the Research Triangle Regional Partnership followed by the NC Department of Public Instruction CTE updates on curriculum, assessment software, and analysis and reporting. Before lunch, Jerianne Taylor, Technology Education Coordinator for Appalachian State University, gave members insight on challenges and strategies to promote, "Working Together, CTE Administrators & Teacher Educators". After the NCACTEA Luncheon & Business meeting, the afternoon sessions began with a presentation on SAS Programming Institute for High School Educators and concluded with a tour of the SAS Campus located near the conference hotel.

The conference ended on Friday promoting the Career, College theme with a Community College presentation from Dr. Judith Mann, Associate Vice President of Program Services, Academic and Student Services of the North Carolina Community College System. She was followed with an energetic visit from our State Superintendent, June Atkinson and our State CTE Director Rebecca Payne with information on state updates and initiatives. The day ended with a farewell to Greg Gift who announced his plans for retiring as the Assistant State CTE Director and a motivating "Ready, Set, Go" overview of Career and Technical Education successes by Joan McGinnis, CTE Director, Onslow County Schools. The 2010 Fall CTE Administrators conference was packed full of information and engaging activities and was again a huge success. 

When the NC General Assembly convenes its new session on January 26, 2011 both the Senate and House will be controlled by the GOP for the 1st time in over a Century. This is as a result of the sweeping defeat of the Democratic Party in this year's Mid Term Elections. The unofficial results show that the new Senate will have 30 GOP to 19 Democrats while the house will have 67 GOP to 52 Democrats with one race still to be decided.

What does the shift in party control mean for CTE? We will start getting some answers when the new legislators presents a budget. In the mean time NCACTE is asking all of its members across all Divisions to personally write a letter to each new member of the Senate and House of Representatives prior to the start of the new session in January. In your letter we would like you to:

· Congratulate the new member from your district

· Welcome him/her to their new position and

• **Introduce** yourself to him/her as a Career Technical Educator (CTE) - **NOT** as your specific program area!!!

As many of you may be aware our state experienced one of the worse recessions in many, many years, as did the nation. While recovery is slowly returning CTE and many other areas of government is likely to continue to suffer *budget cuts*. Consequently, our letter writing *as a group* will open the eyes of our new Legislators of who we are and the many lives we touch everyday educating and train our students for the **job market**. Our hope is that Legislators will think twice about CTE funds as they prepare the next 2011 budget.

Unity is strength, so let us all write letters to our Legislators, new and returning. We could also make this a project for our students and FBLA members by having them join us in the letter writing.

North Carolina Nurse Aide Candidates are now **registering** to take the NNAAP (National Nurse Aide Assessment Program) competency examination online at <u>https://pulseportal.com</u>. Online registration allows the NNAAP exam to be scheduled faster and decreases processing time. Candidates registering online pay with any credit or pre-paid gift card issued by Visa, Master Card, or American Express. Paper registration is still available but will be more costly than the online registration in the near future. To register for the NNAAP exam, candidates will need the test center number, training program code, valid email address, and social security number. Many high schools now offer in-facility testing, in those cases the test center number can be obtained from the instructor. There's big news at NC State. The Technology Education teacher education program has been fully revised to meet new NCDPI requirements, College of Education revisioning and implementation of some common-core college courses, current trends at ITEEA, and to align with the new scope and sequence for technology education at DPI CTE. The new curriculum and new courses were all approved last week and they come into service effective Fall 2011. Our new name for the undergraduate program: "Technology, Engineering and Design Education" (TDE) has already begun to attract more teaching majors and we will have our largest group of student teachers since way back in the 1970's this Spring (19) plus there is one finishing up this semester making 20 total for this academic year. Our TECA group had success at Eastern Regionals winning the Transportation contest (an autonomous robot designed and built entirely on-site) and placing third in the Poster Session competition. Dr. Jim Haynie retires in May and Dr. Ted Branoff becomes the new undergraduate Coordinator effective January. Dr. Joe Busby will take the lead with senior level methods and student teaching management. There are more than 100 teaching majors in the pipeline and the nonteaching options are being phased out which allows us to put even more emphasis on our central mission to prepare outstanding technology teachers for North Carolina. We look forward to hosting the NCTEA Conference Friday-Saturday February 4-5, 2011 here at NC State and those attending will see recent updates in our laboratories as well as the Solar House environmental research center. Readers of The Technology and Engineering Teacher will see an article in this month's issue about the GRID-c Project which makes real-time data on environment, weather, and Solar House efficiency available for students in your classrooms--come on to the NCTEA Conference so you can

actually see the facilities making the data available.

Contacting Your Elected Officials

Now that the mid-term elections are over it is time to think about contacting your elected officials and remind them that students enrolled in CTE programs have a much higher graduation rate than the general population. Recent data shows CTE programs graduate about 87% of their students. If your representative was not in this election cycle or they were re-elected, write a letter to them citing examples of success you have had and encourage them to support CTE funding whenever a vote includes it. For newly elected officials, Send them not only your success but give them a little background on your CTE program. They do read your letters, especially when they first get elected, so this is the time to establish an advocate. When you get a reply you might even invite them into your classroom as they usually like to get invitation to speak.

Here is how you get their information:

First you have to find your full 9 digit zip code. "Who Represents Me?" When you click on their name it will send you to their WEB Page that has address, email etc.

Remember, these are the folks that are controlling your school funding so your effort is helping to keep more CTE jobs.

Carolyn Banks, technology education teacher at East Hoke Middle School in Hoke County and NC Association Technology Education President spent this past summer on a journey of a life time. Mrs. Banks spent part of her summer break in Houston Texas as part of a teacher focus group for NASA's Explorer School project.

The NASA Explorer Schools (NES) project is NASA's classroom-based gateway for middle and high school students that provides authentic learning experiences designed around NASA's unique missions while promoting student engagement in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). NES offers a "best of" collection of NASA content and curricular support resources for teachers to implement into their classrooms. NES participants have access to:

STEM curriculum support materials developed around NASA's most innovative research and scientific discoveries

Electronic professional development and virtual support to assist with the implementation of classroom content

Live interactions among students and NASA Scientists and Engineers through Web casts and facilitated, online conversations

First-hand accounts of new discoveries and mission updates directly from NASA subject matter experts Through partnerships with national educational organizations and use of best educational practices, the NES project hopes to inspire students to participate in NASA missions and develop their aptitudes in STEM.

This Fall NES is launching this NASA opportunity nationwide. Schools and teachers interested in the NES project can register for the upcoming school year and find more information about the NES Project at http://explorerschools.nasa.gov

Last year East Hoke Middle School was a pilot school for the program. The highlight of the program was the Lunar Growth Chamber. This activity allowed students to an opportunity to design container and build containers to grow plans on the moon. It was a fun time for the students as they grew basil, pumpkins, popcorn, and watermelon seeds in there specially design contains. Marketing Teacher Spotlight

Marketing Education would like to highlight one of our fellow teachers, **Scott Armstrong**, from North Forsyth High School in Winston Salem. Scott is setting a great example of how to actively use technology in the form of a wiki to encourage both teacher and student collaboration within his school and county. Read on to hear Scott's story.

Wikipedia: **wiki** ($/\Box$ wrki/<u>WIK-ee</u>) is a <u>website</u> that allows the easy creation and editing of any number of <u>interlinked web pages</u> via a <u>web browser</u> using a simplified <u>markup language</u> or a <u>WYSIWYG</u> text editor.^{[1][2][3]} Wikis are typically powered by <u>wiki software</u> and are often used to create collaborative wiki websites, to power community websites, for personal <u>note taking</u>, in corporate <u>intranets</u>, and in <u>knowledge management</u> systems

For teachers who are learning the curriculum to a new class, a wiki can be invaluable. I learned this first-hand when I started teaching the re-written Computer Applications I curriculum in 2008. Two other teachers on my hall were also teaching the revised curriculum, and I was looking for a central place to store ideas, worksheets and tests/quizzes (since we had to write our own assessments at that point).



I started the ForsythCTETeachers wiki on PBWorks in order to collect ideas that teachers use in various CTE classes. I no longer teach Computer Applications I--I've moved on to Sports & Entertainment Marketing I & II. The same scenario applies to these classes, too. I use the wiki to publish ideas, articles and projects that I'm using in class, and other teachers have added their own ideas as well. My hope is that a teacher that is new to the classes I teach can take ideas from the wiki and use them in the classroom, rather than having to re-invent their own wheel.

Since I started the ForsythCTETeachers wiki, I've also used a wiki for my classes to collaborate on projects, and our department has a PLC wiki so we can share ideas and have online collaboration.

YARBOROUGH ACTE TEACHER OF THE YEAR AWARD FINALIST

ALEXANDRIA, VA – The Association for Career and Technical Education (ACTE) announces Kristina Yarborough, of Hope Mills, North Carolina, as the Region II winner for ACTE's Teacher of the Year award. Yarborough is one of four finalists competing for the national title of 2011 Teacher of the Year, which recognizes educators who have made

significant contributions toward innovative, unique and novel programs that are serving to improve and promote career and technical education (CTE). The winner will be announced during the ACTE National Awards Ceremony at ACTE's Annual Convention in Las Vegas on December 3.

Yarborough is a family and consumer science teacher in Cumberland County Schools, and she teaches Early Childhood Education I, II and Honors, and Parenting and Child Development. She is the FCCLA advisor and has doubled the number of students participating in the organization over the past five years. She is consistently recognized for having 80 percent of her students score proficient on CTE end-of-course tests.



In her classroom, she has partnered with Partnerships for Children, an organization in the county that helps provide child care centers, parents and grandparents with educational resources for children in their care. Her early childhood education students intern through the organization, and students earn certifications in Sudden Infant Death Syndrome, which allows them to obtain experience with infants.

Yarborough has been a member of the county's "Pathway Team" advisory council, which is a group of teachers and business and industry leaders working together to promote student learning, since its inception, and she has developed informational brochures for businesses and teachers. Summers organized numerous blood drives, which collected more than 600 units of blood and affected more than 1,500 people's lives. When one of her students passed away from Leukemia, the student body came together to organize a bone marrow drive, and Summers personally supported each donor through the process. 
