

<u>**Cultivate A Career</u>**—Liz Vaden, Career Development Coordinator at Graham High School, and Rae Johnson, Career Development Coordinator at Eastern High School in Alamance County, volunteered at the DPI state sponsored Cultivate a Career exhibition. Approximately 100,000 people experienced the Cultivate a Career exhibit. The CDC's educated people about Agriculture careers and assisted in the completion of career assessments. With their help, the lives of many North Carolinians was changed.</u>

<u>Career Expo</u>—The Chapel Hill-Carrboro City Schools and Orange County Schools held a "Career Expo" in mid-November at the University Mall in Chapel Hill. Over 100

businesses attended this event, including representatives from medical, education, business, transportation, engineering, and green careers. This Expo was open to Grades 7-12, and it was an excellent opportunity for students and parents to ask questions and visit with professionals in the students' areas of interest.

Y.E.S. Conference—This Fall, the Cabarrus Regional Chamber of Commerce, Cabarrus County Schools and Kannapolis City Schools presented their annual Y.E.S. (Youth Employability Skills) Conference for Juniors and Seniors in the seven Cabarrus County High Schools and A.L. Brown High (from the Kannapolis City School System). A bevy of local businesses helped provide both dynamic speakers and economic support for this event. Workshop presenters highlighted the "soft" skills that workers should utilize as they attempt to enter the workforce (including the application process, resume writing, interviewing, etc.). Other soft skills, which highlighted the essentials needed to settle into a "real" job, were also discussed at the Y.E.S. Conference.

Instructional Management

Common Core State Standards & CTE



Many of you have probably been involved in one form or other in the training process of the new CCSS (Common Core State Standards). Because of the forward thinking leadership from our state CTE (Career and Technical Education) staff, it has been enlightening to see how CTE courses fulfill or enhance many of the reading and mathematics CCSS. As CTE moves forward, and aligns itself with CCSS, we as a system will collectively grow and be able to work together better. The RBT (Revised Blooms Taxonomy) transitional process we have been going through over the past few years has definitely made CTE alignment much easier; as the CCSS have, for the most part, adopted similar language in their standards.

Moodle

The introduction of the IMC (Instructional Management Coordinator) Moodle is a valuable tool, so continue to check and use the Moodle. However, be mindful that the Moodle is not a secure forum for posting. Secure messages should be sent directly to the intended recipient. Remind teachers that they need to be members of their program area Moodle only. The North Carolina Department of Public Instruction consultants will be monitoring members and removing individuals who are not eligible for membership.

Instructional Management Coordinator Eight Hour Induction

Coming soon to a local education agency near you is the reformed 80 hour induction program. Over the past year, a team of experienced IMCs and NCDPI consultants have retooled the 80 hour induction requirements. The course will be online and broken down in different modules based upon importance/priorities of the job. The end goal of the induction program is to provide experience and offer support to newly hired IMCs. Upon completion of the modules, each participant will be able to submit and print a certificate of completion. More information will be forthcoming.

NCACTE Teacher of the Year... To recognize teachers who are providing outstanding career and technical education programs for youth and/or adults in their respective fields and communities. Recipients of this award must have made significant contributions toward innovative, unique and novel programs that are serving to improve and promote career and technical education.

NCACTE Outstanding New Career and Technical Teacher... This award is meant to encourage new teachers to remain in the profession. Recipients of this award must have made significant contributions toward innovative, unique and novel programs and have shown a professional commitment early in their careers.

NCACTE Outstanding Career and Technical Professional... To recognize career and technical educators, other than full-time classroom/laboratory teachers, who have recently provided or currently are providing significant contributions to professional associations and career and technical education programs for youth and/or adults in their fields, communities and/or states. Recipients of this award must have made significant contributions toward innovative, unique and novel programs; and/or improvement, promotion, research or development of programs of career and technical education.

NCACTE Outstanding Teacher in Community Service... The purpose of this award is to recognize teachers with significant accomplishments and outstanding leadership in programs and activities that promote community involvement. Recipients of this award must have made significant contributions toward training, motivating, and inspiring their peers and students to become involved in programs and projects that benefit their communities.

NCACTE Policy Maker of the Year... This award is presented annually by the NCACTE Board of Directors to recognize policymakers who have made a contribution of significance to career and technical education.

- (page 5) Section A—Professional Memberships and Activities (must include dates of service).
- (page 6) Section B—Professional Contributions (may include presentations and publications).
- (page 7) Section C—Education and Experience Background (to include educational preparation and work experience; should include dates of service for work experience).
- (page 8) Section D—Civic and Community Involvement (to include civic, fraternal and/ or honorary memberships and community activities or contributions).
- Letters of support, limited to a maximum of six, should be pages 9-14 of the nomination dossier. Letters should be one page in length. These letters should come from the following individuals:

(page 9) the nominee's immediate supervisor
(page 10) an administrator
(page 11) a colleague or former student
(page 12) a community lay person
(pages 13 and 14) two additional letters of choice

One photograph of the nominee (the photograph is used for publicity purposes only). Digital photo should be at least 300 dpi and in .jpg format.

All materials must be typed in 12 pt. Times New Roman font on 8-1/2 X 11 sheets with 3/4" margins, left, right, top and bottom.

All materials must be submitted at the same time as a complete package.

Together We Are!

Things are coming along well for NCTIETA. We have just completed our NCTIETA Fall T&I/Tech Ed Program Area Update Workshops for the year. These workshops were held in 7 of the 8 regions of the state and included updates from Industry, SkillsUSA/TSA student organization, NCDPI T&I consultants and the Certification Consultant and a NCTIETA update. Numbers were not as good as we would have liked them to be but those that did attend were all very happy with the information sharing from both sides. NCDPI will take the information from these workshops to assist them as they continue to support all T&I programs across the state.



We also had one of the best T&I Fall Conferences on record with

approximately 100 paying attendees. The Charlotte Motor Speedway was our main host. Starting with our Banquet on Thursday Night of the conference at the Charlotte Motor Speedway's Speedway Club, attendees were treat to great food and a great start to the conference with our Keynote Speaker, Richmond Gage, Director of the Rowan-Cabarrus Community College Motorsports Program. Mr. Gage spoke on the importance of Motorsports to North Carolina and how building relationships has led to the NC State Legislature declaring Motorsports the official state sport. He followed up with the importance of building relationships between Industry and educational providers. This is what led to the success of the RCCC Motorsports program. The concluded by stressing the importance of building the same type of relationships between post-secondary schools in motorsports and their local high school programs. The key to success for everyone, especially the students, is to build those relationships.

- On Friday, several industry supporters provided facilities and workshops for our teachers:
 - Automotive teachers met at Roush-Fenway Racing for workshops and received a special tour of their facility by one of their staff who was a recent graduate of the RCCC Motorsports program.
 - Construction programs met at the Association of Builders and Contractors (ABC) of the Carolina's new training facilities. Teachers received updates on the new Core and Sustainability course to be offered beginning next year. Additional workshops were provided on Green Technology. A great workshop on Rigging was also provided.

Four workshops were provided at the Charlotte Motor Speedway Media Center:

- Applied Software provided training for the teachers on the AutoCAD certification. Applied Software also provided the teachers free vouchers for the certification test. They had planned on taking the test during the conference but the testing site was unavailable during the time of the conference.
- CET/NET teachers were treated to workshops by ExplorNet. These workshops addressed common issues with the CompTIA certification and other teaching issues.
- Adobe provided two workshops for our Digital Media teachers. Adobe continues to be one of our strongest supporters of these programs.
- A generic track was also present. Mr. Todd Thibault, a T&I CET/NET teacher, presented two workshops: 1) Moodle servers, and 2) Free online resources. A workshop on Green Technology was present by Learning Labs, and NCDPI presented a workshop on "Any Excuse for Math". This is a follow up to the workshop conducted during last summer conference.

Additionally, a number of tours were conducted on Friday afternoon. These included race shop tours, speedway tours. NASCAR Hall of Fame, RCCC Motorsports Program, and NASCAR Tech.

On Saturday the conference was completed with our annual fall business meeting. A number of issues were address and voted on during this meeting. NCDPI T&I Consultants presented an update and SkillsUSA State Director, Glenn Barefoot, presented their Update. The conference concluded with a 50/50 drawing and an auction.

Region II Conference a Great Success


